Integrating Environmental Peacemaking in the Reforms of the United Nations

The year 2005 is the year of the review of the Millennium Development Goals and for the reform of the United Nations to prepare it for the challenges of the 21st Century. In December 2004, the UN High-Level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change laid out a strategy for this reform, and in January 2005 the Millennium Project presented its recommendations on how to reach the Millennium Development Goals.

The UN High-Level Panel Report highlighted the importance of including threats such as poverty and environmental degradation into the future global security system. This session of the Commission for Sustainable Development will define national and international strategies to achieve the water goals of the Johannesburg Agenda. Its outcome will influence both the Millennium Review Summit as well as the Special Session of the General Assembly in September.

The side event organizers aim at stimulating the debate of the inclusion of environmental cooperation and peacemaking in the reform agenda of the United Nations. Water cooperation in the Middle East and Eastern Africa in particular show how collaboration can work in conflicted areas and can even be a key to prevent and resolve conflicts.
