Sotomayor's presentation will focus on Mexico's 2000 lawsuit before the International Court of Justice (ICJ) that challenged the capital-murder convictions of Mexican nationals in the United States. He will discuss the principal motivations and consequences for U.S.-Mexico relations of a Mexican foreign policy that sought adjudication before the ICJ.

VICTOR ESPINOZA VALLE

Researcher, El Colegio de la Frontera Norte in Tijuana "Expatriate Voting in the 2006 Mexican Presidential Election- What We Must Discuss"

Espinoza Valle will explore why so few Mexican expatriates cast ballots in the most recent federal election in 2006. He believes our understanding of the political culture of Mexican migrants in the U.S. to be limited and argues that for many, their connection to the home country may be emotionally based and rarely expressed in participation in formal civic roles.
