Speakers' Bios

Michael Johnston is Charles A. Dana Professor of Political Science at Colgate University. His most recent work has focused on contrasting syndromes of corruption, in which he highlights underlying development issues and ways of building the foundation for reform through "deep democratization." Johnston's published works cover issues of political corruption, comparative and American politics, public policy, democratization, and development. His articles have appeared in such journals as *The Political Quarterly, American Political Science Review*, and *Journal of Democracy*. Johnston holds a B.A. from Macalester College and a Masters in Philosophy and a Ph.D. from Yale University.

Cynthia McClintock is Professor of Political Science and International Affairs at The George Washington University. She has written numerous books on Peru, and is the author of numerous scholarly articles appearing in journals such as *World Politics* and *Comparative Politics*. McClintock has served as president of the Latin American Studies Association, director of the Latin American Studies Program at George Washington University, chair of American Political Science Association's Comparative Democratization Section, and a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. She has a B.A. from Harvard University a Ph.D. in political science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Alfonso W. Quiroz is a Professor of History at Baruch College and Graduate Center, City University of New York. He has authored several books and studies on institutional and economic issues of modern and colonial Latin America, particularly Peru and Cuba, including Domestic and Foreign Finance in Modern Peru, 1850-1950; Deudas olvidadas: Mecanismos de crédito en la economía colonial peruana, 1750-1850; and La deuda defraudada: Consolidación de 1850 y dominio económico en el Perú. He is also the editor of special issues of Colonial Latin American Review. In 2008-2009 he received a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation fellowship for the study of constitutional debates in the Hispanic world. He was a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center for International Scholars and holds a Ph.D. in history from Columbia University.

Álvaro Vargas Llosa is a Senior Fellow of The Center on Global Prosperity at the Independent Institute, as well as a nationally syndicated columnist for the *Washington Post Writers Group*. Vargas Llosa has written books on Latin America, Peru, and Ché Guevera, and contributed to numerous media outlets including *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, and the BBC World Service. He was the press spokesman for the presidential campaign of the Democratic Front in 1990 in his native Peru and an advisor on international relations for the presidential campaign of Perú Posible in 2001. Mr. Vargas Llosa received his B.S.C. in international history and an M. A. from the London School of Economics.
