## Speakers' Bios

**Tomás Bilbao** is Executive Director of the Cuba Study Group. Prior to joining the Cuba Study Group, Mr. Bilbao served as Director of Operations for the successful campaign of Mel Martinez for the U.S. Senate. From 2001 to 2003, Mr. Bilbao served as Personal Aide to Secretary Mel Martinez and as Deputy Director of Operations at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the administration of George W. Bush.

**Ignacio Sanchez** is an attorney at DLA Piper who represents national and international clients on a broad range of issues before the executive branch, Congress and the federal courts. He currently serves on the board of the Woodrow Wilson Center. Mr. Sanchez previously was on the Bush-Cheney Transition Team as the director of the policy advisory committees for the Department of the Treasury and for the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative. He has provided testimony at congressional hearings and written articles on sanctions policy and international property rights and expropriation. Mr. Sanchez has also lectured before the annual meeting of the International Law section of the ABA, the Florida Bar, the University of Miami School of International Studies, and before the Cuban American Bar Association. He obtained a BA and a JD from the University of Miami.

Lars Schoultz is the William Rand Kenan, Jr., professor of political science at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He has written five books on Latin America and U.S. foreign policy, including, most recently, *That Infernal Little Cuban Republic: The United States and the Cuban Revolution*. His articles have appeared in journals such as *American Political Science Review, Journal of Politics*, and *Political Science Quarterly*. Dr. Schoultz was president and held several chair positions at the Latin American Studies Association (LASA), and has had numerous fellowships including those from the National Humanities Center, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and the Ford Foundation. He holds a BA in English literature and an MA in Hispanic American studies from Stanford University, and a Ph.D. in political science from the University of North Carolina.
