

# Views on the Canada-US Relationship




## US-Canada Relations: Past and Future

- 27% of Canadians reported the relationship over past 5 years had "gotten worse" compared to 12% of Americans
- 31% of Canadians and 25% of Americans think the relationship will get better over the next 5 years
- □ In both cases: a majority of respondents think relationship has and will stay about the same
  - But more Canadians have firm opinions

# Familiarity and Integration

- Canadians are more familiar with the US
- Social: many Canadians have family and friends living in the US
  - 75% of Americans have no family/friends in Canada
- Personal: 32% of Americans have never visited
   Canada, compared to only 5% of Canadians
- Economic: 17% of Canadians think their incomes are very dependent on US, compared to 2% of Americans




# Views on Future Integration

- 21% of Canadians would like to see more integration while 24% want less
- 41% of Americans would like to see more integration and only 6% prefer less integration
- Critical views of relationship do not dampen support for maintaining current relationship or improving it



# Most Important Issue Facing Canada-US Relations (1st and 2nd mentions)





### Free Trade Means Unrestricted Access to Resources














# Next Steps: American Demand

### **Net Demand for More Government Action (Americans)**




# Next Steps: Canadian Demand

### Net Demand for More Government Action (Canadians)



### Conclusions

- Americans have positive view of Canadians and relations but are less integrated; Canadians are more critical of relationship and US
- Policymakers should be aware of public opinion and take it into account
  - Canadians are watching closely
  - Americans seem to expect Canada to have influence; perhaps they are willing to accept explicit policy direction from Canada
- □ Greater communication and information is key
