

# Stages of Adolescence\*

#### Stage

Preadolescence girls 9-12 boys 10-13

#### **Characteristics**

Fast growth, sensation seeking Impulsive, start logical thinking



Early Adolescence girls 12-14 boys 13-15 Increased sensation seeking
(esp. boys)
Biological/cognitive change (esp. girls)
Peak peer pressure susceptibility

Mid Adolescence girls 14-16 boys 15-17 Peak sensation-seeking

Major opening to abstract thinking,

(e.g., about social justice and

gender equality)

Biological changes; self-image affected



Literacy (32% v 5%)


 Complete secondary education (66% v 46%)

Vocational skill (99% v 22%)







## UDAAN a Public Private Model



 Government of Jharkhand & State AIDS Control Society



- UDAAN adapted
- Scale up reached +300,000 students 1485 gov't schools
- 87 Master Trainers & 2,161 Nodal Teachers

## Lessons Learned

- Younger students gained more, especially girls
- Students that attended more regularly gained more
- Sensitizing District **Education Officers &** school principals
- Advocacy w/ gov't & communities
- Teachers need pre/in service training & monitoring

## **BLOOM** in Nepal

- Peer Education
- Literacy
- Menstrual taboos
- National Girls' Congress
- Youth as Agents of Change
  - +800 youth educators reaching 2400 peers
  - 4,945 home visits
  - 16,571 community members reached





## South African Model

 In-school girls (10-14) in South Africa, Lesotho & Swaziland

 Improve intergenerational communication to build bridges between girls and their families

 Build capacity of implementing partners to strengthen sustainability

## Better Life Options in Nigeria



- 51% of recent program graduates re-enrolled in formal or vocational schools
- Project Support
   Committees trained & engaged to support project
- Work-study scholarships

"I keep thanking God everyday for making me join this program. I have told my friends all about a work plan.... I have never heard that word before I joined the work-study program. Now I am a full time office worker. There are many things I can do in an office and I am not ashamed to work into any office anymore."— 16-year old girl from Ibeno

## **BLOOM** in Egypt

#### **New Horizons**

- 77,000 girls reached
- 365 NGOs/youth centers
- 21 of 26 governorates
- Increased selfconfidence
- Improved communication skills
- Increased awareness & willingness to discuss gender issues



### New Visions

- 15,000 boys reached
- 216 NGOs
- 11 governorates
- Improved coping skills
- Greater self-confidence
- Greater knowledge SRH
- More equitable gender views
