As eight years of Lula's presidency comes to a close, how do Brazilians evaluate their country? And how do they perceive Brazil's place in the world? Published on the eve of the October 3 presidential and general elections, a new report from the Pew Research Center's Global Attitudes Project examines these and other issues, including: views of Lula, national conditions, the economy, the environment, international relations as well as key institutions, from the military to the media. Based on a survey conducted in the spring of 2010, the report also reveals perspectives on gender and examines Brazilian views on having a woman as president.
