Women's Contributions to Governance: Findings from Research in Rwanda

WASHINGTON—On Friday, April 11, the Africa Program of the Woodrow Wilson Center, along with The Initiative for Inclusive Security, will host a panel discussion on women's contribution to governance in Rwanda, featuring His Excellency James Kimonyo, Rwandan Ambassador to the United States; Ambassador Swanee Hunt, President, Hunt Alternatives Fund, and Chair, The Initiative for Inclusive Security; and Elizabeth Powley, Director, Rwanda Project, The Initiative for Inclusive Security.

This event will focus on the release of The Initiative for Inclusive Security's path-breaking research on how women's leadership contributes to the development and stabilization of society, using Rwanda, which has the world's highest percentage of female parliamentarians, as a case study and model.

"The Initiative for Inclusive Security study into the contribution of women's leadership to the development and stabilization of post-genocide Rwanda has implications for transitional societies everywhere. This initiative is one of the first to examine in depth the transformative impact of women's participation on legislative priorities and, more generally, on governance," said **Howard** Wolpe, director of the Wilson Center's Africa Program.
