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Ivani Vassoler is Assistant Professor in the Department of Political Science at the State University of New York, Fredonia, where she is also the director of the International Studies Interdisciplinary Program. She teaches a variety of international politics courses, and her areas of expertise are policies and politics of developing nations, Inter-American relations, and urban Latin America. Dr. Vassoler is involved in several international education projects and has directed study abroad programs in Brazil and Mexico, with the participation of several undergraduate students. She also has experience in international journalism, having worked as reporter in Brazil, and later as a foreign correspondent in Mexico City and Washington DC. She is currently working on a new research project focusing on participatory processes on Brazilian municipalities. She holds a PhD in Government and Politics from the University of Maryland, an MA in International Relations from the University of San Diego, and a BA in Journalism from the School of Social Communication Cásper Líbero, in São Paulo, Brazil.

**EDUARDO ROJAS, PRINCIPAL HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT SPECIALIST,
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Eduardo Rojas is a Principal Specialist in Urban Development with the Inter-American Development Bank. He joined the Bank in 1989 and has worked in housing, municipal and urban development loans and technical cooperation projects. His current responsibilities comprise policy and strategy formulation and best practices research and dissemination in the urban sector. His main areas of work include: housing sector reform and low income housing programs, urban heritage preservation, and integrated urban development. He also serves as team leader and advisor of project teams in the assessment of innovative urban development, housing, municipal finance and urban heritage preservation loans. Prior to joining the Bank, he worked with the Regional Development Department of the Organization of American States and as Assistant Professor of Urban Planning in the Master's Degree Program in Urban Studies at the Catholic University of Chile. He holds a degree in Architecture from the Catholic University of Chile, an M.Phil. in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Edinburgh, an MBA, with a concentration in Finance, from Johns Hopkins University, and a Diploma in Environmental Management from Centre d'Etudes Industrielles in Geneva, Switzerland.

TIM CAMPBELL, CHAIRMAN, URBAN AGE INSTITUTE

Tim Campbell has worked for more than 30 years in urban development with experience in scores of countries and hundreds of cities in Latin America, Asia, Eastern Europe, and Africa. His areas of expertise include strategic urban planning, city development strategies, decentralization, urban policy, and social and poverty impact of urban development. The Urban Age Institute fosters leadership and innovation between and among cities in areas of strategic urban planning, urban policy and management, sustainable environmental planning, and poverty reduction. Tim Campbell retired from the World Bank in December of 2005 after more than 17 years. His most recent positions at the Bank were as head of WBI's urban team (from 2001), and head of the Urban Partnership, which was responsible for identifying changing demand and developing new Bank products and services for cities (from 1998). He was the Bank-wide coordinator for City Development Strategies (CDS), a new analytical tool focusing on cities as the unit of analysis in national development. From 1995 to 1997, he served as a member of the Advisory Group in Latin America and the Caribbean Region and was the Region's Chief of the Urban and Water Unit from 1993-1995. He holds a BA in Political Science from U. C. Berkeley (1966), a Master's in City and Regional Planning from U.C. Berkeley (1970), and a PhD in Urban Studies and Planning from M.I.T. (1980).
