In a study published last November, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) reported that Central America was the most violent sub-region of a very violent continent. Indeed, the UNDP concluded that, other than countries at war or undergoing severe political violence, Central America is the most violent region in the world. Rates of homicides have been three times the world average and have increased steadily throughout the last decade. Criminality, not poverty or other economic issues, tops the list of citizen concerns.

Viewing security as a universal right to be guaranteed by the state, the UNDP calls for comprehensive strategies that go beyond police and criminal justice reform to address issues of social inclusion, prevention, and the construction of a civic culture founded on the rule of law.
