Ms. Baldinger is an independent consultant for projects focusing on energy and environment in Asia, particularly China. Her current projects include establishing an environmental finance training program in China for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency; analyzing the relationship between investment and the environment for the U.S.-Asia Environmental Partnership (US-AEP); and coauthoring a policy brief on U.S. Energy and Environmental Cooperation with China with the Woodrow Wilson Center. Before setting up her own firm, Ms. Baldinger served as Director of China Operations at the U.S.-China Business Council. She managed the Council's field offices in Beijing and Hong Kong, overseeing their activities and developing extensive working relations with Chinese officials and organizations, as well as foreign investors, multilateral donors, and nongovernmental organizations. Between 1990 and 1995 she served as Editor-in-Chief of *The China Business Review*, and was a guest lecturer at the Foreign Service Institute. Ms. Baldinger received a Masters of Science from the London School of Economics and Political Science and she has done intensive Mandarin training in Taiwan and the United States.

Ms. Knight has 20 years experience in the fields of economic analysis, forecasting, business development and marketing, including 10 years of market development for energy efficient products in international markets. During the early years of her career, Ms. Knight was responsible for developing economic analysis and forecasts for market growth and demand for telecommunication services. Ms. Knight joined AlliedSignal Inc. (now Honeywell International) to lead their U.S. regulatory efforts promoting the value of energy efficient transformers to state utility commissions, electric utilities, and federal government programs. Ms. Knight joined the International Institute for Energy Conservation (IIEC) in Bangkok, Thailand as a Senior Project Manager directly responsible for implementing the China and India energy efficiency market transformation program. This program focuses on industrial motor, transformers and includes standards, labeling and certification, market development and promotion, technical assistance, and finance initiatives. In 2001 she relocated to Washington, D.C. to act as the Director of Strategic Programs for IIEC and the Civil Engineering Research Foundation (CERF). In addition to her ongoing activities in China and India, she oversees all energy efficiency, sustainable communities, and renewable energy programs implemented by IIEC in China, India, and Latin America. Recently Ms. Knight assumed responsibility for the newly formed *Center for Sustainable Infrastructure*, leading the global multidisciplinary initiatives in energy, water, materials, and transport. Ms. Knight received an M.S in Economics (1982) and B.A. in International Affairs and Economics (1977) from Texas Christian University-Fort Worth, Texas.

Mr. Taylor has worked on energy development at the World Bank since 1982.
