A Message from the President, Director, and CEO of the Woodrow Wilson Center

uring my two decades as a Member of the U.S. Congress, I traveled several times to Brazil and witnessed firsthand the scope of our two countries' shared interests. Brazil is the largest and most dynamic economic force in South America, and a vibrant bilateral exchange between our governments, our business communities, and our peoples is crucial to securing political, economic and social progress in the Western Hemisphere.

Founded in 2006, the Brazil Institute has become the premier program in Washington for dialogue on Brazil-U.S. policy and serves as a lane of excellence for the Wilson Center, our nation's living memorial to President Woodrow Wilson. The Center honors his memory by bridging his two passions: scholarship and policy. We bring together thought and action—policymakers, scholars, and business leaders—in the hope that frank dialogue will build understanding, stronger cooperation, and better public policy.

Given rising political tensions around the world, as exemplified by the rhetoric surrounding the 2018 presidential elections in Brazil and our own political deadlock in Washington, the Wilson Center's emphasis on constructive, nonpartisan debate aimed at bridging divides—between countries, political parties, and individuals—has never been more essential. Many of the issues I studied during my visits to Brazil—science and technology, defense and international security cooperation, energy, sustainable development, and rule of law—remain highly relevant to Brazil-U.S. relations. As President, Director, and CEO of the Wilson Center, it has been my privilege to support the exceptional work of our Brazil Institute over the past year to strengthen bilateral cooperation in these areas.

he year 2018 marked a consequential shift for Brazil, as voters elected a new government and set their country on a new path forward. As Chairman of the Brazil Institute Advisory Council, it has been my privilege to help guide the work of the Brazil Institute, which has sought to explain these developments to Washington while continuing to promote constructive bilateral engagement.

Now, more than ever, given increasing polarization and uncertainty, the Brazil Institute provides a much-needed nonpartisan forum for public policy debate on a wide range of issues, from Brazil-U.S. defense cooperation to the rule of law and corruption. Although much of 2018 was focused on the twists and turns of the presidential elections in Brazil, the Brazil Institute continued to produce exceptional content and events on the underlying public policy challenges facing Brazil. Its twin workshops on sustainable development in the Brazilian Amazon, one in Manaus and one in Washington, brought together scientists, policymakers, government officials, the military and civil society to discuss how Brazil can promote economic development without sacrificing its unparalleled environmental resources. A separate workshop explored comparisons between the administrative state in Brazil and the United States, delving into civil service reform, the importance of strategic planning, and federal budgeting. A roundtable on reducing corruption in infrastructure and the construction sector led to valuable feedback on ways to improve transparency in the public procurement process.

The Brazil Institute is a reference for understanding the most pressing social, economic, political, and environmental issues facing Brazil. Through its many initiatives, events and interdisciplinary research, the Institute facilitates constructive and open dialogue with a range of stakeholders, creating the space needed to not only envision, but also to enact policies that will lead to a more prosperous Brazil.

Already 2019 is shaping up to be a year of change for Brazil and for the world. I urge you to remain engaged by following the work of the Brazil Institute, attending events and connecting with its experts. I encourage those seeking a more active role in the ongoing Brazil-U.S. dialogue to join me on the Brazil Institute Advisory Council, which will continue to support this indispensable forum for Washington.



A Message from the Director of the Brazil Institute at the Woodrow Wilson Center PAULO SOTERO

B razil's democracy is young, but has already proven its resilience. It has survived the impeachment of two presidents, damaging economic recessions, and ongoing investigations into systemic corruption at the highest levels of government and business. The press and judiciary remain independent and highly professional. A new culture of compliance has taken root in the private sector, and efforts to improve transparency and attract investment in the oil and gas sector, which was at the center of the massive corruption scandals, have paved the way for positive regulatory changes and successful auctions of pre-salt oil fields.

Yet the stunning election of the untested, far-right congressman Jair Bolsonaro to the presidency in October 2018 has laid bare Brazil's deep polarization and the exhaustion of its traditional political parties and leaders. Bolsonaro's past statements have unquestionably raised concerns regarding his commitment to democratic norms, rule of law, and human rights—especially the rights of minorities, women, and the LGBTQ+ community. Moreover, Bolsonaro's highly divisive, social media-based campaign raised concerns about the impact of misinformation and disinformation in a country with 130 million social media users, where the internet is the most common vehicle for news consumption. The 2018 elections in Brazil have also led to speculation that the moment is ideal for deepening Brazil-U.S. relations. These are issues to watch in 2019.

These are just some of the issues that the Brazil Institute has highlighted over the past year, and will continue to cover through our program of lectures, seminars, and conferences. The Institute was honored to continue its work with the São Paulo Research Foundation (FAPESP), renewing its commitment to fostering dialogue and bilateral collaboration in the fields of science, technology and innovation. A workshop with Brazil's National School of Public Administration discussed civil service reform, budgetary processes, strategic planning and other critical public administration issues through comparing Brazil and the United States. We were also thrilled to launch two books: "O Lobby Desvendado" (Lobbying Uncovered) in cooperation with the BRAVA Foundation, which examines the regulation of private-public sector relations in Brazil; and "Novos Caminhos Para a Inovação no Brasil" (New Paths For Innovation in Brazil), in partnership with Interfarma. It is through these types of partnerships, and the conversations they produce, that public policy moves forward. The Brazil Institute looks forward to continuing its mission of advancing dialogue on important issues relevant to Brazil and Brazil-U.S. relations in the year ahead.
