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Working Group on Environment in U.S.-China Relations

The Environmental Change and Security Project's Working Group on Environment in U.S.-China Relations is an ongoing multidisciplinary forum that considers how U.S. foreign policy and assistance might be more effectively crafted to produce more environmentally sound development and better relations with the People's Republic of China. Alton Jones Foundation, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration of the Department of Commerce.

ENVIRONMENTAL CHANGE AND SECURITY PROJECT

Since October 1994, the Woodrow Wilson Center's Environmental Change and Security Project (ECSP) has provided specialists and other interested individuals with a "road map" to the myriad views, activities and policy initiatives falling under the rubric of "environment, population and security." Through meetings, publications, and the activities of the staff, ECSP explores a wide range of academic and policy-related topics: the various theoretical conceptions of environment, population, and security linkages; how environment, population and security ideas are nested in the broader debate over redefining security; how policymakers in the United States and other countries are utilizing these ideas and making related policies; and how governments, nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), businesses and other organizations are responding to the causes and symptoms of important environmental and demographic issues. ECSP has helped to expand the network of experts from diverse professional backgrounds, fostering new dialogue and comparative insights as a neutral forum and information clearinghouse. Similarly, the Project tries to expose numerous scholars and practitioners not working on environmental and population issues to these timely and important analyses and debates, thereby spurring greater interest in the field.

THE ASIA PROGRAM

The Asia Program of the Woodrow Wilson Center has, since 1977, been highly regarded as an ideal forum for bringing historical depth and contemporary understanding of Asian issues to the nation's capital. The Asia Program has conducted research on a variety of disciplines throughout Asia and has sponsored international workshops such as, *Understanding Chinese Foreign Policy: History and Practice*.

THE WOODROW WILSON INTERNATIONAL CENTER FOR SCHOLARS

The Wilson Center, established by Congress in 1968 as a memorial to the nation's 28th president, fosters scholarship and intellectual exchange among scholars and practitioners. It sponsors an international fellows program, has an independent Board of Trustees (composed of ten citizens appointed by the President of the United States and nine government officials—including the Secretary of State), is non-partisan and does not take positions on any public policy issues.
