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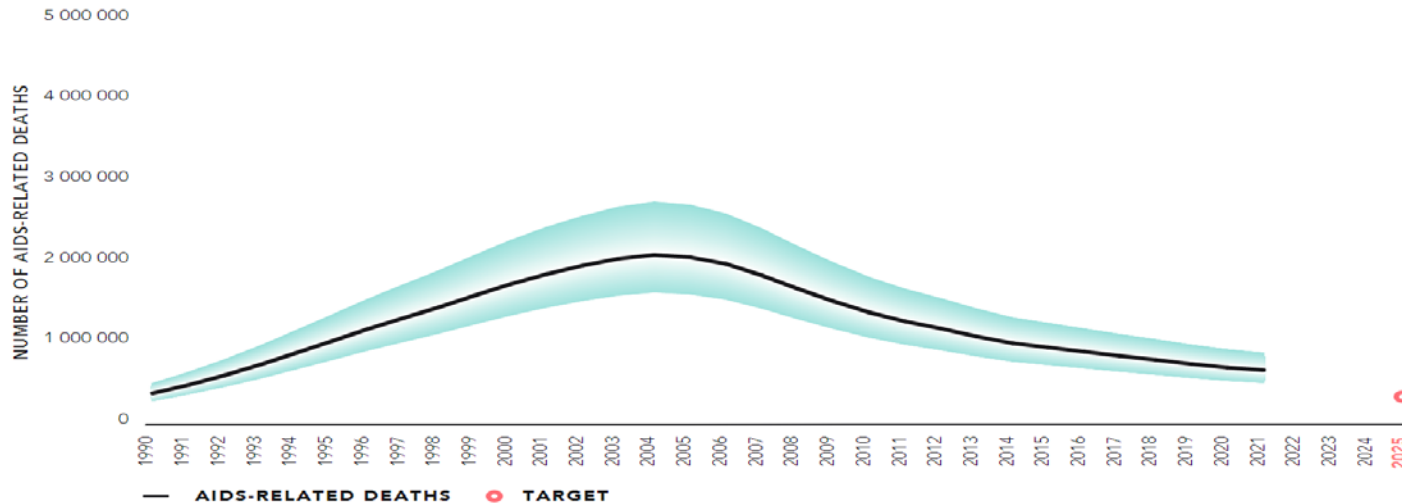


20 Years of PEPFAR Past Successes and Future Potential

PEPFAR-supported HIV Outcomes

(PEPFAR and CDC Data, 2023)

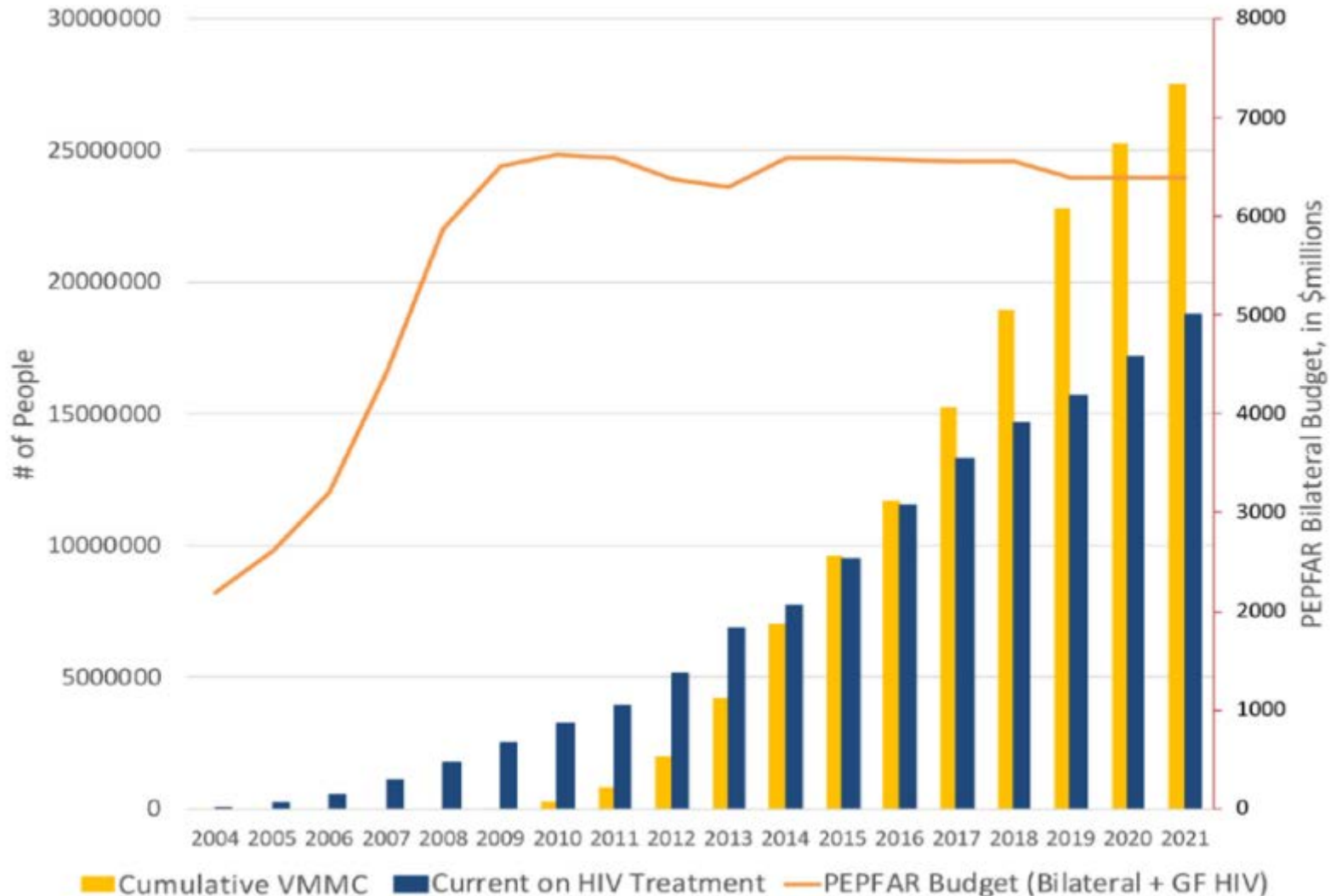
- 20.1 million on life-saving ART (300x increase since 2004)
- 95% of people with HIV on PEPFAR-supported treatment worldwide virally suppressed
- 25 million lives saved
- 5.5 million babies born HIV-free

PEPFAR-supported Development Outcomes

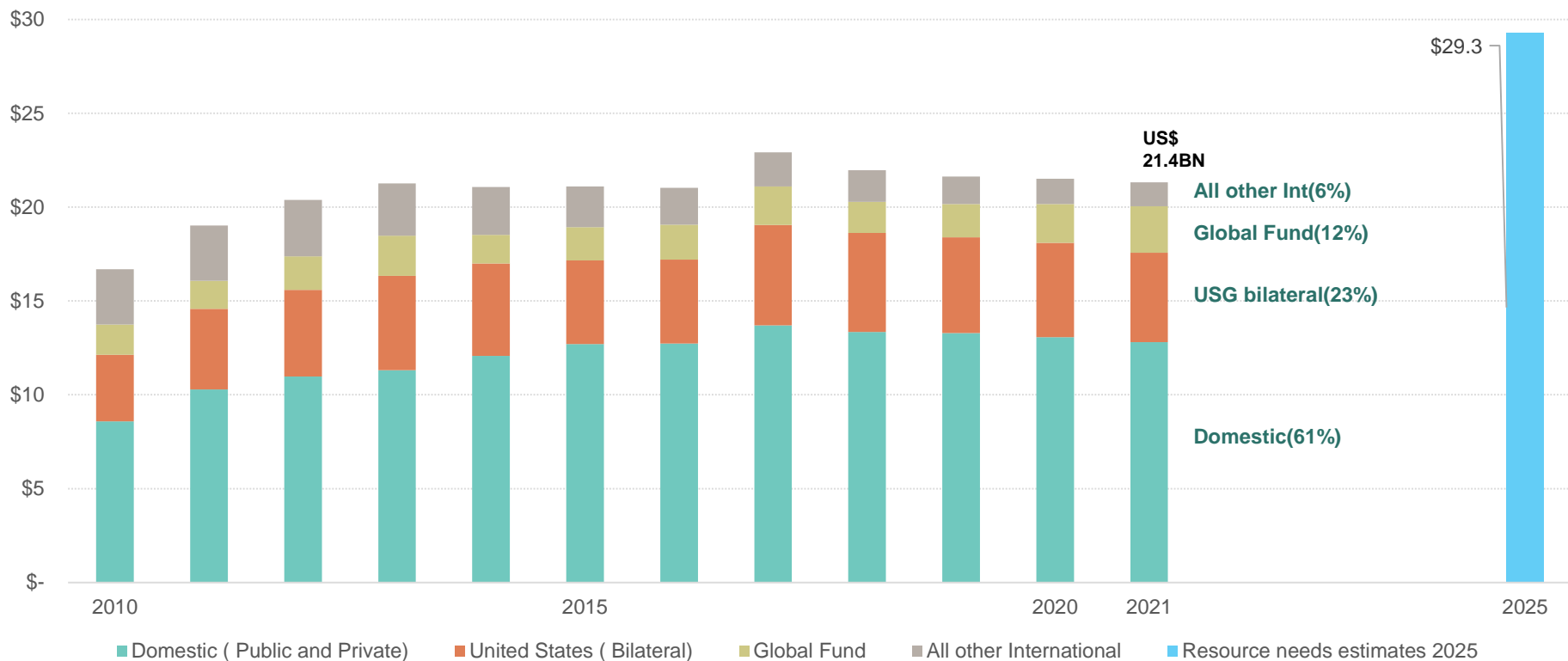
- 2.1% GDP per capita increase
- 35% reduction in child mortality
- 9% reduction girls and boys out of school
- 10% increase in immunization rate

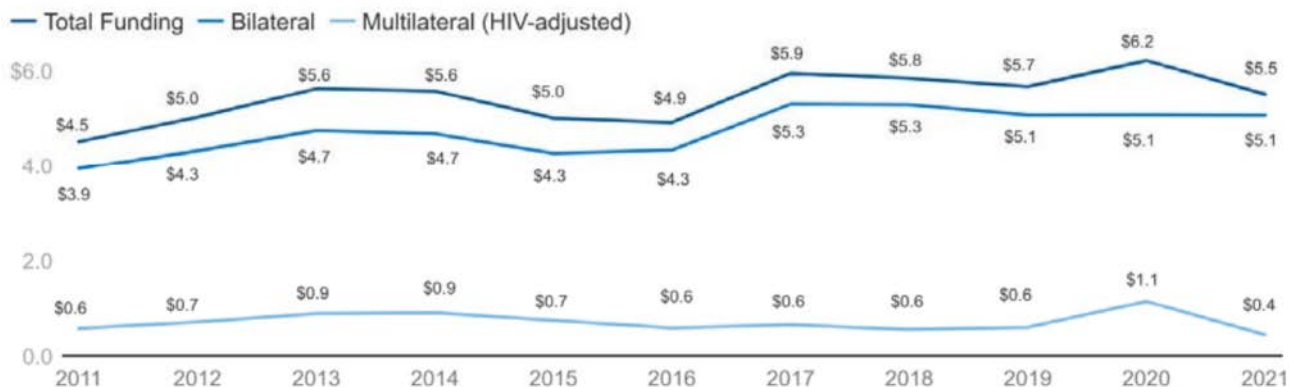
HIV Resources for Low- and Middle-Income Countries, 2010-2021, and 2025 Target

US\$ Billions

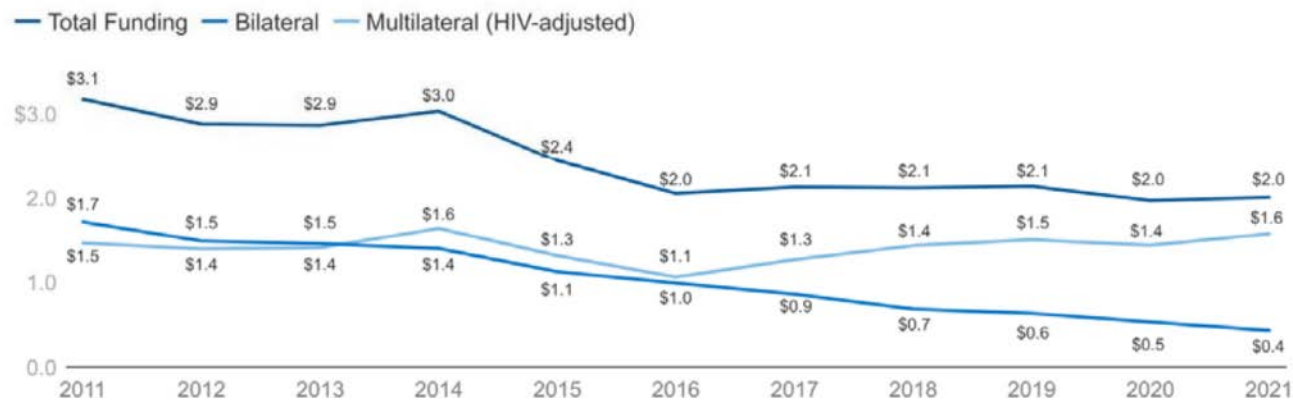
