Drawing on his experience as a senior government official and analyst, Mr. Denmark leads the Wilson Center's research on the geopolitical dynamics of the Indo-Pacific and contributes to its industry-leading analysis on U.S.-China relations. He is also an Adjunct Associate Professor at Georgetown University.

Denmark is the author of *U.S. Strategy in the Asian Century: Empowering Allies and Partners* (Columbia University Press), which was received with positive bipartisan reviews. He has testified multiple times before the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, and his commentary has been featured in several major media outlets, including *Foreign Affairs*, the *Atlantic*, the *New York Times*, and the *Washington Post*.

Denmark previously served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for East Asia, where he advised the Secretary of Defense and other senior U.S. government leaders on a broad set of security issues related to East Asia, including the development and implementation of U.S. defense strategies, plans, policies, statements, and activities in the region. Before joining the Pentagon, Mr. Denmark was a Senior Vice President at the National Bureau of Asian Research, where he was the co-editor of the landmark *Strategic Asia* book series. He also held analytic positions at the Center for a New American Security and in the U.S. Intelligence Community.

In January 2017, Mr. Denmark received Secretary of Defense Medal for Outstanding Public Service. He has also received the Order of the Resplendent Banner from the Republic of China (Taiwan), was made an Honorary Rear Admiral in the Navy of the Republic of Korea, and was named a 21st Century Leader by the National Committee on American Foreign Policy. He is a member of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and the Council on Foreign Relations.

A Colorado native, Mr. Denmark received an M.A. from the University of Denver Korbel School for International Studies, and a B.A. with Honors from the University of Northern Colorado. He is pursuing a Ph.D. at Kings College London. He lives with his wife and children in Maryland.
