- Reproductive Cancers



Funding Gap for Full MNH Care is \$431 Million and \$93 Million for Family Planning Annually in Pakistan


Per Capita current spending, required spending and the gap in funding for full family planning and maternal and newborn health care in Pakistan


Fulfilling Unmet Need for Modern Contraceptive Services would Reduce at least 3 Million Unintended Pregnancies in Pakistan

Reaffirming GLC Priorities for Pakistan

- Pakistan cannot afford the full SRHR package but prioritizing the lower hanging gains of eliminating unmet need has to be a priority for 2020 – 2025
- Equity should be core value for additional spending 3 million women in the lowest two quintiles with unmet need for modern contraception and 2 million for full maternal & neonatal care must be give priority
- Reproductive health needs of women have emerged as a priority likely to be overlooked during the COVID-19 pandemic as not regarded as emergency services
- Cheaper solutions in telehealth and helplines have emerged as cheaper and wider reach for women during COVID19 but will extend beyond
